



Each gentle fawn is protected from danger by its camouflaged coat, as well as by its parents. Our precious Savior, full of grace and truth, came to Earth as a tiny baby. He depended on His earthly parents and His heavenly Father for protection (John 1:14).

YOU WILL NEED:

- Decorative Snow
- Small Decorative Trees
- Craft Paper
- Cardboard
- Pieces of Sticks
- Paint and Brushes
- Air-Dry Clay
- Moss
- Modeling Spatula
- School Glue
- Hot Glue Gun
- Scissors



DIRECTIONS:



1. Roll these parts for the fawn out of air clay: a head, a body with a tail, 2 ears, 2 antlers, 4 hooves, two folded front legs and 2 folded back legs. Remember that air clay dries fast, so try to make all the parts quickly.



2. Connect all the parts as shown in the picture. Turn the deer's head slightly.



3. Roll three tiny balls of air clay for the eyes and nose and attach to the face. Let dry.



4. Paint the fawn in shades of brown. Paint the antlers, nose, eyes and hooves black.



5. Paint dark brown stripes down the fawn's back and the back of its head. Paint light-colored spots and some tiny black spots on the fawn's back.



6. Using brown paint, dry brush some contour details on the fawn.



7. Crumple a piece of craft paper. Glue a roughly cut oval piece of cardboard in the middle of the paper.



8. Glue the edges of the craft paper over the cardboard and secure well with glue, pressing down to make an almost flat surface.



9. Hot glue pieces of branches and artificial trees to the back edge of the cardboard surface.



10. Glue moss to the front edge of the cardboard.



11. Scatter a few drops of school glue around the top. Add artificial snow. Let it dry. Shake off the excess.



12. Place the fawn in the middle of the cardboard. Isn't he well camouflaged in his natural surroundings? Just as the fawn has been given protection, we too can depend on God to take care of us.
