

PASSOVER CELEBRATION

God instituted the Passover as a reminder and celebration of the Israelites' deliverance from Egypt. When Hezekiah and the people rebuilt the temple and returned to worshiping as God instructed, they were filled with joy and excitement as they celebrated the Passover (2 Chronicles 30).

UNLEAVENED BREAD

YOU WILL NEED:

- 2 Cups Flour + Additional for Kneading & Rolling
- ½ - 1 Teaspoon Salt
- Rolling Pin
- Large Bowl
- 1 Cup Water
- Measuring Cups
- Measuring Spoons

- Fork
- Skillet



DIRECTIONS:



1. Place water, salt, and flour into the mixing bowl. Stir the mixture with a fork until it begins to hold together.



2. Turn the mixture out onto a lightly-floured surface and knead the dough for 3-5 minutes.



3. Divide the dough into 8 small balls.



4. Dust the surface with a little more flour and roll out each of the balls into a large circle. Prick gently all over with a fork.



5. Heat a dry skillet. Add a circle of dough and cook for about 30 seconds, pressing out any air pockets that form. Flip the bread over and cook on the other side. Repeat for the remaining circles.

FESTIVE PLATES

YOU WILL NEED:

- Clear Plastic Plates
- Black Permanent Marker
- Colored Permanent Markers



DIRECTIONS:



1. Turn one of the plastic plates upside down. Draw the outline of your design with a black marker.



2. Fill in all the outlines with colored markers.



3. Place the next plate over the one you made and trace the pattern. Color. Make enough plates for everyone.

TABLE SETTING

YOU WILL NEED:

- Forks, Knives & Spoons
- Tan Fabric
- 2 Strips of Blue Fabric
- Plates, Cups & Napkins
- Toy Figurines of People and Animals



DIRECTIONS:

Spread the tan fabric over the table. Gather the blue strips along the length of the tabletop. Arrange the figurines between the blue strips. Set the table according to the number of place settings you need, using your new plates, and place the unleavened bread on the table.

We too can celebrate by decorating our table, reminding us of God's deliverance and crossing of the Red Sea.
